<p><i>Curriculum Description</i></p> <p>The Associate in General Education curriculum is designed for the academic enrichment of students who wish to broaden their education, with emphasis on personal interest, growth and development.</p> <p>Course work includes study in the areas of humanities and fine arts, social and behavioral sciences, natural sciences and mathematics, and English composition. Opportunities for the achievement of competence in reading, writing, oral communication, fundamental mathematical skills, and the basic use of computers will be provided.</p> <p>Through these skills, students will have a sound base for lifelong learning. Graduates are prepared for advancements within their field of interest and become better qualified for a wide range of employment opportunities.</p> <p><i>Certificates and diplomas are not allowed under this degree program.</i></p>			

<p>GENERAL EDUCATION CORE (15 SHC)</p> <p>The general education core includes study in the areas of humanities and fine arts, social and behavioral sciences, natural sciences and mathematics, and English composition. Within the core, colleges must include opportunities for the achievement of competence in reading, writing, oral communication, fundamental mathematical skills, and the basic use of computers.</p> <p><u>The associate in general education curriculum program shall include a minimum of 15 semester hours of credit from general education curriculum courses selected from the Combined Course Library, including six hours in communications, three hours in humanities/fine arts, three hours in social/behavioral sciences, and three hours in natural sciences or mathematics. Courses must be at the 110-199 or 210-299 level</u></p> <p>English Composition (6 SHC)</p> <p>— Humanities/Fine Arts (3 SHC) Select courses from the following discipline areas: music, art, drama, dance, foreign languages, interdisciplinary humanities, literature, philosophy and religion.</p> <p>— Social/Behavioral Sciences (3 SHC) Select courses from the following discipline areas: anthropology, economics, geography, history, political science, psychology, and sociology.</p> <p>— Natural Sciences/Mathematics (3 SHC)</p> <p>— Mathematics Select courses from the following discipline areas: college algebra, trigonometry, calculus, computer science, and statistics.</p> <p>or</p> <p>— Natural Sciences Select courses from the following discipline areas: astronomy, biology, chemistry, earth sciences, physics, and/or general science.</p>

<p>OTHER REQUIRED MAJOR HOURS (49-50 SHC)</p> <p>Other required <u>major</u> hours include additional general education and professional courses.</p> <p>A maximum of 7 SHC in health, physical education, college orientation, and/or study skills may be included as other required hours. Selected topics or seminar courses may be included in a program of study up to a maximum of three semester hours credit.</p> <p>TOTAL SEMESTER HOURS CREDIT (SHC) IN PROGRAM: 64-65</p>
